Chicago, Oct. 13.—Umpires who officiated in the World's Series have appealed to the National Baseball Commission to increase the share of the financial prize from \$1,000 to \$2.000 each. President Johnson, of the American League, a member of the commission, said that the request had been received.

The four umpires, in their appeal, pointed out that the Reds, victors in the series, received more than \$5,000 each, while the losing White Sox got about \$3.500 each.

"It is our hope that the commission believes the umpires as necessary to the series as the players," the appeal read in part.

Fresident Johnson said the commission had not taken any action. The request for the additional \$1,000 was signed by Umpires Rigler and Quigley, of the National League, and Nallin and Evans, of the American.


