Soviet Facing Crisis as Cossacks and Russ Near Petrograd

London, Oct. 15. — With General Denikine's Cossack Army advancing from the South and the northwestern Russian forces almost within striking distance of Petrograd, the Soviet Government of Russia appears to be facing a crisis. Bolshevik head-quarters at Petrograd were closed last Thursday according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Reval. The Northwestern Russ an Army has apparently crashed through the Bolshevik lines over a wide front. Pskov has been captured and it is believed that the forces under General Yudenitch have also taken the important town of Luga, about 85 miles southwest of Petrograd. The capture of Yamburg, 75 miles from

miles southwest of Petrograd. The capture of Yamburg, 75 miles from Petrograd, was reported on Monday, and latest dispatches indicate the line of advance to be nearly 125 miles in length.

On the South, the Denikine troops appear to have approached quite near the town of Tula, which is considered the key to Moscow from that side. A dispatch received here says that if Tula falls to the Cossacks, the Bolshevik commissaries will flee into Turkestan, taking advantage of a gap between the Denikine and Kolchak forces in the Volga valley.

Letts Reject Offer of Armistice Made by Col. Avaloff Bermondt

Copenhagen, Oct. 15. — The Lettish press bureau in a dispatch says the Lettish command absolutely rejected the offer of Colonel Avaloff Bermondt for an armistice.

It adds that the prisoners taken from the forces of General Von Der Goltz and Colonel Avaloff Bermondt were virtually all Bavarians.

Six German merchant ships have been captured during the past two days by the British torpedo boat destroyer Westcott, which took them to Reval, says the Dally Mail's Reval correspondent.

"According to a report from Riga," the correspondent adds. "Colonel Avaloff Bermondt asked the Allies if he would obtain terms from the Letts, but the Germans imprudently fired on the Allied fleet in Riga bay. It is reported that the destroyer Vanoc returned the fire, and it is also reported, but not confirmed, that the fleet landed a force."

He is being sought as the result of information said to have been given the Federal authorities by Anton Gorski, who is under arrest.

Canvinced that Ivanhoff has fled from Gary, the Federal authorities to-day transferred their search for the radical leader to Chicago, where dozens of Department of Justice investigators are reported to be following clues.
