Canadian Wool Clip This Year Expected

Winnipeg, Manitoba, Oct. 18. —
While the estimate is not yet complete for the wool clip of Canada for 1919, it is officially stated that it promises to record the high mark for a decade in the Dominion. The 1918 output was approximately 12, 000,000 pounds. The price of wool this year is from 40 to 70 cents per pound in eastern markets for grades ranging to fine medium combing.

Previous to the war there was a wool shortage evident. The war has accentuated the shortage. During the period of hostilities it is estimated that 60,000,000 sheep were slaughtered in Europe, reducing the possibilities of the world's output 400,000,000 pounds annually.

The price of wool in Canada in 1913 was from 12 to 25 cents. With war inflated prices of wool there are many more farmers to-day in the Dominion raising sheep.

According to census figures, the sheep population of Canada in 1918 was 3,052,748. This small number shows the depressing effects of adverse conditions of former years on the sheep business.
