

Bellefonte, Pa., Oct. 27.—For the first time since electrocution was made the death penalty in Pennsyl-vania, three men to-day were sent to the electric chair at the Western Peritentiary at Rockview. They were William Evans, col-ored, of Dauphin county, who killed Rufus Gillam in Harrisburg; John Sandoe, of Lancaster, who murdered 4-year-old Anna Mary Hershey, and Gregory Pharos, of Lancaster, who murdered Peter Mormous. Evans was taken to the chair at 7.05, Sandoe followed and Pharos was last. It was 7.29 when the last man was pronounced dead.
