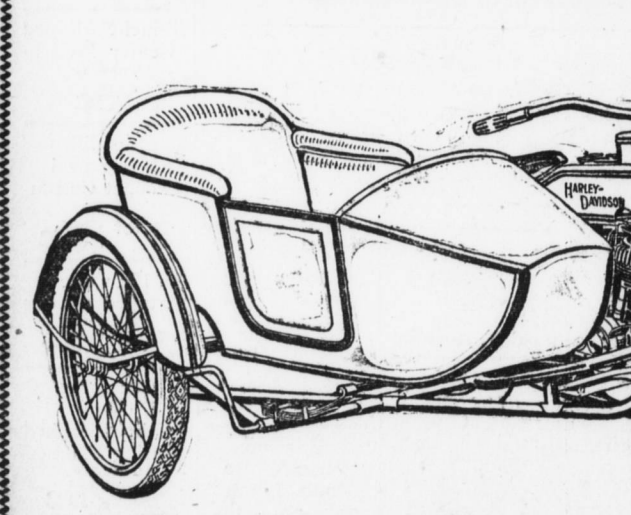

"CLEAN UP," SAYS BURGESS M'ENTEE

Week of November 3 to Be Observed as Clean-Up Week in Borough

Burgess McEntee on Saturday issued a proclamation calling upon all the residents of Steelton to clean up their premises of rubbish during the week of November 3. In the proclamation the burgess refers to such a clean-up as a possible prevention of the repetition of the influenza epidemic which about a year ago was at its height in the borough. It was quite noticeable then that while the epidemic reached into the cleaner sections of the borough, it had its root and growth in those sections of the town which are noted for their filthy condition.

The highway department will cooperate with the residents of the borough during the clean-up week and the rubbish removed from the premises will be taken care of immediately. During the week following the clean-up, the police department will make a thorough investigation. All premises not thoroughly cleaned up will be reported to the burgess and action taken.

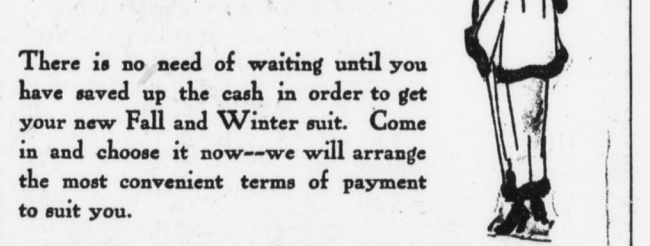
