New York, October 28.—The great railroad safety drive now being conducted by the Safety Section of the Operating Division of the United States Railroad Administration is a great success. The first three days of the campaign showed a reduction of 65 per cent in casualties over the corresponding days of the previous year in the eastern region. At the end of the third day twenty-five of, the forty-six Class 1 railroads had a perfect score. Of the fifty-five Class 2, 3 and switching terminal properties in the eastern region, only one had reported an injury.
