

Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 29.—The inding at daybreak to-day of two loudies on the shore of Lake Ontario, wearing life preservers bearing the name of the steam barge Homer Warren, of Toronto, revealed the total loss of that vessel, with her crew of eight. The shore was strewn with wreckage. The Warren, in charge of Captain Scaller, of Toronto, left Oswego, homeward bound yesterday morning with 1600 tons of coal. She was last seen off Pultneyville, 35 miles east of here, at 11 a. m. yesterday while the gale was raging. She is believed therefore to lave gone down during the night.
