Mr. Sites reviewed the work of the Harrisburg postoffice from the beginning of the twentieth century until the close of the war. He spoke of the great work that had been accomplished throughout the department, and of the efforts made in this city to improve the service in every way.

Mr. Sites spoke of the opportunities which confront Harrisburg as a growing city, and cited the present printers strike and the unexpected visit of the Kiwanis Club to the city.

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REDS' MYSTERY SHIP
