Coal Necessary to Haul One Passenger Train

Pounds of coal used to haul a passenger car one mile on the Pittsburgh division of the Pennsylvania are given by Superintendent R. T. Morrow as follows:

upon these figures as follows: "Had we maintained this figure at 18.8 or saved only .9 of a pound on each passenger car hauled one mile there would remain in the mines for future generations 1,206 tons of coal. "In freight service, in July, 1919, there were 54. August 41 1-2 and September 43 9 pounds less coal consumed to move 1,000 tons one mile than in the corresponding months of 1918.


