PAL MOORE TO BE OWN MANAGER

Controversy Regarding Memphis Boxer Is Given Explanation

Chicago, Nov. 6.—The tangle over the services of Pal Moore, the flashy Memphis bantamweight, has at last been solved. After the mixups over the arrangements for a match with Peter Herman, the champion of the world, in which Billy Haack failed to land the much-wanted event, Pal has decided to be his own manager for the time being.

Whether or not Moore will fulfill the contract for European bouts as signed by Nate Lewis is not known. If Pal decides to make the trip to Europe, and fight in several matches in Paris and London, he says he will look after his own business, pay Lewis and Walsh for booking the matches and collect the fight guarantees and return home.

George Ferguson, a close friend of Pal Moore, let the cat out of the bag when he offered to back Pal to the extent of \$1,000 that the Memphis bantamweight could beat Joe Burman in a ring contest of from one to 20 rounds.

"I understand that Tommy Walsh has been talking again," says George. "If Pal will make this one match, and I have reason to think he will, I will post \$1,000 forfeit, the same to go as a side bet that Moore beats Burman. I don't care so much about Nate Lewis' money, but nothing would please me more than to separate Talkative Tommy from a portion of his bank roll."

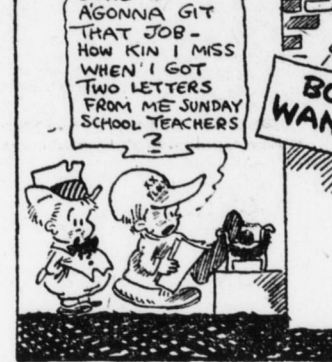

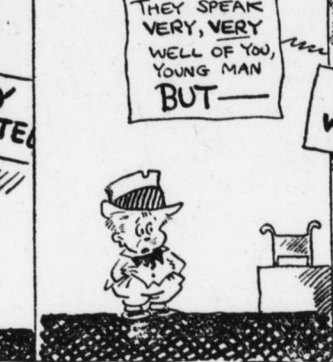
BRITON OUTPOINTS TILMAN
