National Museum to **Exhibit War Trophies** and Allied Uniforms

The new National Museum in Washington will shortly have ready for public inspection a remarkable sollection of relics, trophies and articles associated with the World's War. The task of selection and colection was assigned by the secretary of War to General H. L. War to General H. L. Quartermaster General of

Rogers, Quartermaster General Step Army.

A great deal of this material has already been received and a part of it is arranged in exhibition cases, including samples of uniforms of all the countries engaged in the great conflict.

The exhibit of apparel includes every article worn, together with the equipment in detail. In the case of the uniform of the highest ranking officers there has been an exact duplication of the apparel, including decorations, used by the senior commanding officer in each country.

The collection includes a remark-ble exhibit of chemical warfare naterial, which will be carefully ar-anged by an expert of that branch f the service.


