During the last few weeks in November 354 properties in the city were sold, according to Assessor James C. Thompson, having an assessed valuation of \$662,325. Included in this number were 237 houses or other buildings and 27 vacant plots.

Paris-The French government is inquiring into the high cost of women's furs, because "they have become practically a necessity since winter fashions dictate their use."

Scores of fur shops recently have opened in Paris. Their owners apparently are realising that furs, for many women have become a part of their wardrobe.

Before the war, the government figures show, France's fur sales were not more than 300,000,000 francs annually. Now, it is estimated, the trade will reach 600,000,000 francs.

Retail prices have quadrupled. Even rat skins are worth thirty francs each. Dealers insist they purchased their stocks in Germany, and are making only legitimate profits, but the government intends to find out for itself.

Firemen to Erect Their Memorial in City Park

Mayor Daniel L. Keister, chairman of a committee in charge of attending to the erection of a monument to volunteer firemen of the city who served during the war, announced further plans for the proposed memorial.

Harrisburg will soon become a second-class city and will have a paid fire department, Mayor Keister said. "We plan to use the monument both to commemorate the soldier heroes of the fire companies and the excellent work of the volunteer fire-fighters."

Each company has offered to pay \$100 toward the cost of the memorial, and it is planned to raise \$2,800 for the monument by contributions of \$1 from each fireman. The balance will be raised by a firemen's bazaar and similar events. There will be no soliciting of funds from the general public, Mayor Keister declared.

DONATO'S NYMPHS MAY YET SEE LIGHT

Mayor-elect George A. Hoover attended the Council meeting today for the first time and spoke with the other commissioners for almost an hour after the official session.

Mayor Daniel L. Keister presented an ordinance permitting the construction of a single track in Fourteenth street, Market to State, to be used by the Harrisburg Railway Company, when it is necessary to abandon the tracks in State street from Fourth to Thirteenth, because of the erection of the Memorial bridge.

Cars running east and west in State street will be rerouted, it is understood, so that they will come to Market Square through the Market street subway.

Announcement of the proposed ordinance prohibiting parking in the east side of North Fourth street, Market to Strawberry street. He explained that frequently traffic is blocked at that intersection by automobiles being parked in the east side of the street, preventing northbound traffic.

An ordinance providing for laying water pipes in Sycamore street, to Water Street, and from Sycamore to Caldonia street was also presented.

New York, Dec. 2.-Appeals for delay in the deportations of Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, who recently completed two-year sentences for obstructing the draft law, have been denied. A telegram from Anthony Caminetti, commissioner general of immigration, received by Harry Weinberger, their counsel, made this announcement.

Ellis Island officials are awaiting official orders to send Goldman and Berkman out of the country. They are now on parole in Weinberger's custody.

OLDER BOYS AND BOWMAN'S TRY GIRLS ATTENDING AIR DELIVERY

With the opening address by the Rev. Henry W. A. Hanson, the Older Boys and Girls Conference began this morning at 10 o'clock in the Messiah Lutheran Church. Dr. Hanson spoke on the "Motives For Service" and outlined the spirit of the conference to the 225 delegates from all over Dauphin county who are here for the session to-day.

Following Dr. Hanson's address, there were various conferences of the groups. When the purposes of the main session were discussed, this afternoon at 2 o'clock the second session began and was opened by the Rev. Alfred N. Savres, who made a short address on the "Responsibility of Service." The responsibility was occupied mainly by the representatives from various churches who spoke on the four-fold phase of the service as follows:

Mental activities, by the session Robert Leiby; girls' session, Mildred Burkholder; physical activities, boys' session, Charles F. Lingle; girls' session, Catherine Stoen; religious activities, boys' session, Harriet Stoen; social activities, W. Henry Palm; girls' session, Esther Stoen.

Preston G. Givens and Miss Rebekah Fixter made the address of the representatives about the "Call of the New Age." Following a recreational banquet was served at 6 o'clock.

This evening will see the end of the one-day conference when Mr. Orwig and Miss Fixter will speak on the "Friendship Circle" in the name of the Dauphin County Sabbath School Association will present a trophy shield to the district having the largest representation by girls in the "Friendship Circle" which will mark the beginning of the conference, which according to Dr. Hanson is the most enthusiastically supported effort ever attempted in this way in Dauphin county.

Dr. Martha H. Pollock Dies in Her 73rd Year

Surviving here are her sister, Miss Rachel Pollock, 252 North Second street; Mrs. James David, 1918 S. Adams street; a brother-in-law, General C. H. Carlton, U. S. A. retired, New York; two nieces, Miss Mable Carlton, Rye, N. Y.; Mrs. Martha Wolf Buehler, this city, and three nephews: Seymour Carlton, New York City; J. C. Butler, London, England; and Gerald S. Butler, India.

Funeral services for Dr. Pollock will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at her late residence, the Rev. Dr. Lewis Seymour Mudge, pastor of Pine Street Presbyterian Church officiating. Burial will be made in the Harrisburg cemetery.

Paris, Nov. 20.-Admiral Enrico Millo, commander of the Italian occupation forces along the east coast of the Adriatic, is working hand in hand with Captain D'Annunzio, according to information received here from an authoritative source. All along the Dalmatian coast, it is said, the people believe the Italian fleet and the D'Annunzio army are co-operating for the purpose of occupying all Dalmatia.
