LEBANON VALLEY IN CAGE GAME

Season Starts Next Week; Good Team on Floor This Season

Annville, Pa., Dec. 10.—Only two games are on Lebanon Valley's basketball schedule to be played prior to the Christmas vacation, which begins December 20. The opening game of the season will take place this evening in the gymnasium here, the opponents being the Lebanon Y. M. C. A. five. The second game is scheduled for the following Wednesday evening, when the Lebanon Valley quintet will journey to Bethlehem to play the Moravian College team.

Seltzer Is Captain. The veteran center, who has played on the varsity five for the past couple years, will captain the team this year and each evening has his men in the gymnasium for more than an hour. Two other stars of last year will play with the team which will open the game tomorrow. Moore at forward and Fishburn at guard, with Harvey at forward and Wine at guard have been picked from the other candidates to play in the first contest.

The candidates for the team this year are perhaps greater in number than those for any previous year at this institution. The majority of those at practice each day starred on the football eleven during the past season, among these being Chiles and Schumacher, who played at end; Behman and Smith, tackles; Kleinfelder, center, and Homan, halfback.

A sum was voted from the Murdane memorial fund towards subscribing for four sets of the books written by the former member of the association.

TECH PLANS BIG CAGE SCHEDULE

Season Will Open in Three Weeks With the Strong Alumni Team

Three weeks from to-night the Tech basketball quintet will play its initial contest of the 1919-1920 cage season with the alumni team as the opponent. Because of the fast teams that have been developed during the past several years, there is an abundance of graduate players who will give Tech the hardest run of the season. Red Huston and Glenn Killinger, of the State College squad, with Vic Bihl and Gil Ebner, of Bucknell, will be home for the Christmas vacation. If they put on a uniform they will give the Tech quintet the hardest battle of the year. This quartet, with another player, could likely take the Maroon players into camp.

Yale has not as yet begun practice. Games will be played at the Chestnut Street auditorium with dancing following each contest. Manager Edward Craig has announced three dates. Tech will play with Perkiomen Seminary at Pennsylvania, February 6. The following date they will travel to Tech here at the close of last season.

There Is a Difference Now in Goal From Touchdown

The Penn-Dartmouth, Pittsburgh-W. and J., and Dartmouth-Brown games, which were decided by goals from touchdowns, has started anew the discussion over the advisability of abolishing the count altogether. The goal from touchdowns has taken some hard knocks in its time. In 1883 it ranked 4 points to 2 for a touchdown, and 5 for a goal from the field. The following season the touchdown was increased to 6 points, while the goal dropped to 2. There it remained until 1897, when the touchdown was increased to 7 points and in 1909 to 8 points. In 1912 the touchdown advanced to 6 points.

Officers For Fight Are Many; Prefer to Battle Here

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 10.—"We have the honor to inform you that we have received a cablegram from De la Roche, Paris, asking for a fight here in the Parkview Stadium next June or July.
