Vare Man Named to Succeed "Bill" Finley

Magistrate Thomas F. Watson, Vare leader of the Twenty-second ward, Philadelphia, yesterday was appointed a mercantile appraiser to succeed William E. Finley at a conference of Auditor General Snyder and City Treasurer Shoyer, in Philadelphia. Finley left the board of appraisers to take a seat in the new council, the new charter prohibiting him from holding both places. At the same time, the Auditor General and City Treasurer reappointed the other four appraisers, James A. Carey, John J. Croul, Frank J. Ryan and Fred A. Van Valkenburg. Carey and Croul are Penrose men, Ryan and Watson, Vare men, and Van Valkenburg is affiliated with neither of the political factions in this city. Since City Treasurer Shoyer is a

Vare follower and Auditor General Snyder a Penrose man, each faction got two of the appointments. Appointment of Magistrate Watson was expected, although Joseph L. Baldwin, assistant director of public works, former State fire marshal, was a candidate for the place.

WILLS PROBATED
