

WANTS DEPORTED WITHIN TEN DAYS

Emma Goldman Notifies Attorney General Palmer of Her Action

New York, Dec. 18.—Harry Weinberger, counsel for Emma Goldman, who announced that she would waive her legal rights to ask appeal from the deportation order on which she is to be sent back to Russia with Alexander Berkman, her companion of years, and some 80 other Russian radicals, has forwarded to Attorney General Palmer formal notice of her action.

Miss Goldman, in a statement made public by her counsel, declared she now expects the United States Government to "keep its promise" and deport her "within the 10 days," the limit of which she said "will be up Saturday."

Would Sell Housing Facilities to Relieve Congestion in Cities

Washington, Dec. 18.—Without a dissenting vote the House passed and sent to the Senate yesterday a

bill ordering the sale of housing facilities erected by the government during the war to relieve congestion in many industrial centers. The measure also abolishes the United States Housing Bureau, transferring the properties to the treasury for sale to private persons, either for cash or part payments.

TO BUILD BRITISH TANKERS Philadelphia, Dec. 18.—The Pusey and Jones Shipbuilding Company, of Gloucester, has been given a contract by a British concern calling for the building of three oil tankers to weigh 8,500 tons each. Work will be started at once. They will sail under the American flag.

WILL NOT GIVE WHITE RELEASE

Woman, Also Held in Dansey Case, Will Be Retained, Says Prosecutor

Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 18.—Prosecutor Edmund C. Gaskill declared tonight that he contemplated the release of the woman who was charged with the murder of Billy Dansey, and Mrs. Edith Jones, charged with being an accessory after the fact. He admitted, however, that his men have dug up new evidence in the case, and that there was a possibility that additional arrests would be made in the near future.

Tells of Work Done by American Engineers in France During War

Pittsburgh, Dec. 18.—Houses and buildings built for the doughboys by the engineers of the American expeditionary force, if placed end to end would reach the entire length of France and into Germany, Colonel Edgar Jadwin, U. S. A., told the Chamber of Commerce here yesterday, in addressing it upon construction in France.

Miners' Board May Be Announced Today

Washington, Dec. 18.—The commission of three men to be charged by President Wilson with the task of making a survey of wages and conditions in the coal fields is expected to be announced today. It was learned that the President will seek to have the commission reach a final adjustment in the coal controversy, which will be a model for the settlement of all future wage disputes in the United States and will, in fact, place the wage system upon a different footing, as the President feels must be done if industrial peace is to be secured.

Crooked Insurance Must Go, Donaldson Says

Philadelphia, Dec. 18.—That the State Insurance Commission is run as a public benefit and not a political adjunct, was the assertion of Thomas B. Donaldson, Insurance Commissioner of Pennsylvania, yesterday at the Rotary Club luncheon in the Bellevue-Stratford.

Liquor Interests Place Loss at \$400,000,000

Chicago, Dec. 18.—Liquor interests estimate their losses as a result of the enforcement of the war-time prohibition law at \$400,000,000, according to a statement made here by Levy Mayer, chief counsel for the distillers in the middle west.

MRS. JENNIE D'OLLIER DIES Philadelphia, Dec. 18.—Mrs. Jennie D'Ollier, aunt of Franklin D'Ollier, national commander of the American Legion, fell down the steps in her home and died soon afterwards. Her head was cut, but Dr. John P. Turner, who was summoned, said death was due to heart trouble and not to the accident.

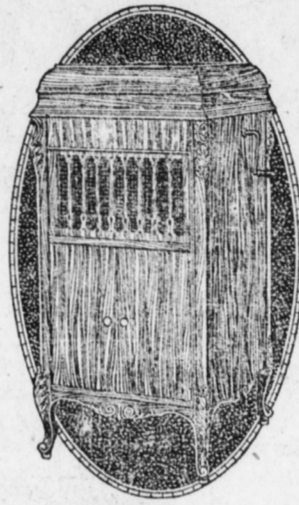

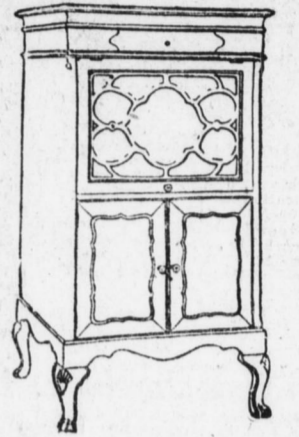
