

SEAL SALE IS DOUBLE RECORD SET BY THE CITY

Harrisburg Buys Thousands of Stickers to Aid Fight on Tuberculosis

With the close of the Red Cross Christmas Seal campaign in the public schools yesterday, D. D. Hammelbaugh, chairman of the seal committee, announced that until Christmas seals can be purchased at a booth in the postoffice.

Complete reports will probably be compiled to-morrow. Mr. Hammelbaugh said many of the buildings sold many more seals than in 1917, and some of these schools will receive a framed picture as a prize for selling more than 5,000 stamps.

With the approach of Christmas the demand for the seals continues, many persons using them on cards, letters and gift packages. The little seal shows that the user has contributed to the funds used to fight one of humanity's worst diseases—tuberculosis.
