National Pike - Slippery from Washington, Pa., to Brownsville; Brownsville to Maryland line, fair condition.

William Penn Highway (Harrisburg to Easton and Philadelphia) - Snowing, but road in good condition; snow plows ready for emergency.

Chambersburg to Harrisburg - Good condition; snowing.

Harrisburg - Fair condition; snowing.

Harrisburg to Altoona - Good condition; snowing.

The State Highway Department maintenance forces are ready for a snowfall of any depth on the connected improved thoroughfares.

New York, Dec. 19.—Monoxide gas poisoning caused the death of four persons, whose bodies were found yesterday at the home of Regner Berdoun, at Sheephead Bay, according to Edward Martin, medical examiner for Kings county, who investigated the tragedy.

Gas From Ignited Fire Sprouts High in the Air

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 19.—Gas, rushing from a Snake Hollow gusher in the McKeesport district, at the rate of 25,000,000 feet every twenty-four hours, was ignited, supposedly by friction during drilling operations.

The well had been producing for a week at a rate of 10,000,000 feet daily and the owners decided to drill deeper into the sand.

FOUR KILLED IN WRECK
