FIFTEEN ASK TO SELL MILD BEER

Dealers in Adams County Petition Court For Light Liquor Privilege

Gettysburg, Pa., Dec. 22.—Fifteen liquor dealers of Adams county have filed petitions in court here for the privilege of selling liquor of less than one-half per cent during the coming year. With National prohibition becoming operative in a few weeks, it was a question as to whether any of the former hotelmen would apply for licenses under the new order of things, but the papers now placed with the clerk of the courts disclose the fact that almost half of them will continue the sale of the modified drink. In the list of 15 applicants there are 13 retailers, one restaurant keeper and one bootlegger. The petitions will be presented to the court for the granting of the licenses on Friday, January 19.

SUES DRIVER OF AUTO FOR \$10,000

Herndon Man Claims Carelessness of H. C. Klingler Gave Permanent Hurts

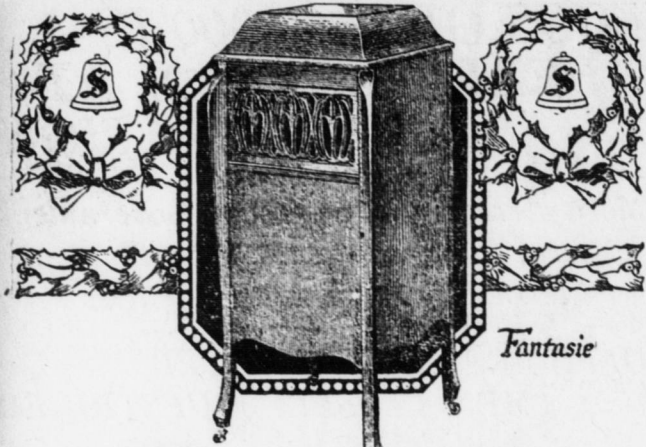
Sunbury, Pa., Dec. 22.—In court here today Ernest C. Hoffman, of Herndon, sued Henry C. Klingler for \$10,000 damages, alleging that his right arm hangs on a piece of wire instead of the usual ball and socket joint as the result of injuries in a runaway accident, which he claims was due to the reckless driving of an automobile by Klingler. The plaintiff declares in his statement that he and his wife were driving through Herndon, Pa. on March 10, 1918, and that as they approached an automobile parked along the side of the road, Klingler drove up from the rear and attempted to run between the Hoffman's buggy and the parked auto. Hoffman's horse was frightened and when the driver had gotten it under control, Klingler again started his car and the animal bolted to one side of the road, mashing the buggy against a fence and then bolting down the road, dragging Hoffman on behind.

SCORES LOAFERS IN CIGAR STORE

Judge Wanner Tells York District Attorney Proprietors Should Be Arrested

York, Pa., Dec. 22.—At the session of juvenile court Judge Wanner let it be known the harboring of youths in and about cigar stores in city and county will no longer be tolerated. Clair Strickler, 15 years old, was before the court to answer to a charge of larceny. Judge Wanner told the court he had been unimpaired that he would not work, stayed out late at night and frequented cigar stores. The father stated that he had taken the boy away from Young and Buser's cigar store, Center Square, one evening, and that he had warned those in charge of the store not to permit the boy to loaf around their place. The court said it was time to enforce the law against proprietors of cigar stores where cigarettes are sold to minors and where other laws are violated. District Attorney Bohow told the court he had warned proprietors, to which Judge Wanner answered that those guilty of violations should be prosecuted. Judge Wanner stated that the Strickler case was a striking illustration of the effects of cigar smoking and cigar store loafing.

Reading, Pa., Dec. 22.—Found in a semi-conscious condition at the foot of Chestnut street this morning, Harry Swigart, aged 40 years, of Ephrata, is said to be the third victim of the disastrous toll from the use of adulterated alcoholic beverages in this city within the past few days. Swigart was rushed in the police ambulance to the Homeopathic Hospital, where it was found his optic nerves have been practically destroyed from the use of denatured alcohol. The hospital physicians say complete loss of sight is a certainty. His condition is grave.

Altoona, Pa., Dec. 22.—Mayor Charles E. Rhodes on Saturday received his certificate of election to the office of mayor for the second term and is now qualified to be sworn into office on Jan. 5. The certificate was held up by reason of the application made by Daniel S. Brumbaugh, Democratic candidate for mayor, for a recount of the ballots. His petition was refused by Judge Thomas J. Baldrige in the common pleas court. The decree was sustained by the state supreme court.

Death Fast Thinning Ranks of War Veterans

Sunbury, Pa., Dec. 22.—Death is thinning the ranks of veterans of the Civil War in Northumberland county, according to figures in the office of County Controller Oswald Kramer. During the year now closing the county paid out \$75 each toward the funeral expenses of 85 soldiers and sailors of the Civil War, as against 56 in 1918. The county makes this contribution toward the funeral expenses of all veterans, provided the entire expense of the funeral does not exceed \$250.
