The Christmas candlelight vesper service of the Young Women's Christian Association will be held next Sunday evening, December 28, at 5 o'clock.

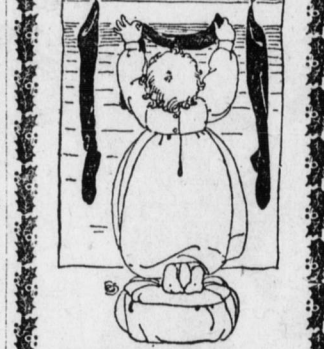
Special Christmas music will be given by the Moorhead chorus under the direction of Mrs. Florence Ackley Ley.
