We learn by Mr. CHAMBERS, the Senatorial delegate from this District, (who returned yesterday morning) that the Union State Convention was complete--133 members present--an unprecedented full delegation, and for the first time outnumbering the Democratic State Convention, which was not full.

The Convention convened at 10 o'clock--MORTON M'MICHAEL, of Philadelphia, temporary chairman. The only disputed seats were those from Montgomery county, from which the sett chosen at the regularly called convention for the purpose (as reported by a committee) were admitted.

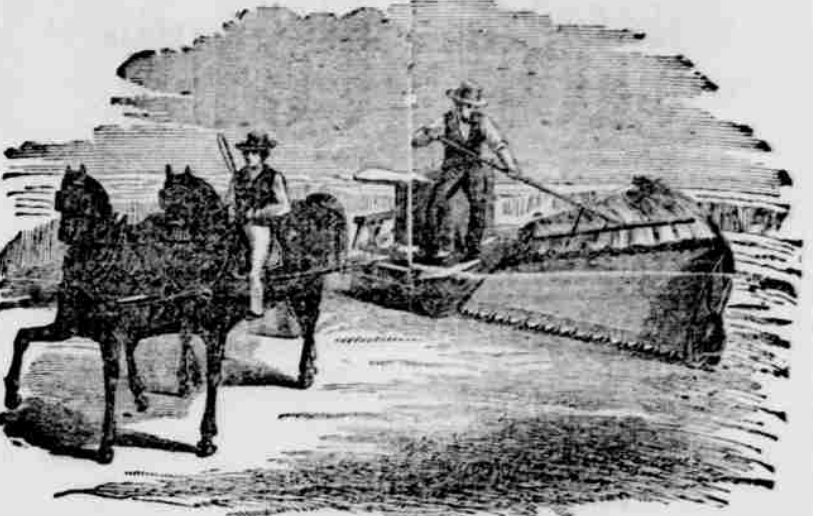
