LATEST NEWS FROM EUROPE.

London, June 24.—There had been no battle on the Minusy, though the armies were face to face.

Paris, Saturday, June 25th.—The Emperor Napoleon telegraphed to the Emperor, dated Sunday, Friday evening, June 24, announcing that another terrible battle had been fought, and the allied forces had obtained a great victory.

St. Johns, N. E., July 4.—The Steamship Adelaide, from Gal way, brings news to the 25th ult.

News Items from Other Counties. President Buchanan will make his annual visit to his favorite summer retreat, the Bellows Falls, about the middle of July.

Lewis Co. Levin, the great American Temperance orator, (for a time Member of Congress) has become an inmate of a lunatic asylum.

WILL THEY DO IT?—At a meeting held the other day in Westmoreland county, a resolution was passed, declaring the principles of Christianity, philanthropy, and common humanity, imperatively demand all Distilleries to stop immediately, and throw the grain they have on hand into the market for breadstuffs.

On Saturday, a son of Mr Pantus, of Zion, Centre county, was thrown from a sulky and injured severely, internally. His life was despaired of for a time, but hopes are now entertained that he will recover.

On the 4th inst., a little daughter of A J Peters of Middleburg, while passing on a foot-log over Middlecreek, fell in, and received a dangerous wound on her head.

The Connecticut Courier heard of a farmer in that vicinity, who, during the frost mania, purchased ten barrels of flour for \$100, and at the same time remarked he had 200 bushels of wheat in his granary, all of which he expected to sell at \$16 per barrel, to his poor, starving neighbors.

In Fayette county there are twelve distilleries. Since the late frost, the owners have been warned by anonymous letters to discontinue their business, and leave the grain to be consumed by the people, on penalty of having their buildings burned.

The Snyder county military voted for an encampment at Middleburg in Sept. MARCH CHASE, Pa., July 1.—A deaf and dumb girl, named Ann McKinley, was instantly killed on day, on the Beaver Meadow Railroad, at Beaver Meadow, by the cars running over her.

A German painter, called "Dutch John," residing in Williamsburg, committed suicide, recently, by severing the arteries of both arms with a razor. He was a man of intemperate habits and kept barbers' hall.

The house of Griffith J. Davis of Valley township, near Danville, was entered by robbers twice in one week. The first night they took \$25 or \$30 from Wm. Montgomery, a boarder. The next night, they fired at a son of Mr. D's, who was watching a ball grazing his person; he fired back, when one entered a hallway stream, and the three disappeared.

The Danville Intelligencer has commenced its 32d volume—and never, it states, has it missed publication a single week. That is rare energy and punctuality.

We fear a couple of the Blomberg Editors have forgotten the resolution of the Danville Type Congress, respecting courts! Harriet S. Robbins, a girl of only three years, last week fell into a live spring in Hamlet Tp., Columbia Co., and was drowned.

We also stated the Sunbury and R.R. Railroad has leased their machinery on Gen. Hays's land, at one of the east slopes of the Allegheny Mountains.

The new Roman Catholic paper, the Metropolitan Review, lately established in New York city with the special approval of Archbishop Hughes, is out in a strong and acrimonious article against Louis Napoleon, Victor Emmanuel, and Garibaldi.

No Use.—The late Democratic State Convention of Ohio, held at Columbus, passed a strong pro-temperance resolution. The Richmond Enquirer, the leading Democratic organ of the South, quotes it, and adds: "Just such a resolution will be proposed at Charleston, and will be voted down by the Conservative Democracy. No chance for compromise!"

Fifty patriotic Democrats, who obeyed the party instructions to "vote early and vote often," at the recent Kansas election, are now in jail at Leavenworth for the fraud. The Republicans believe that they will prove that the Democratic majority in Leavenworth county was more than made up of double and imported votes.

The number killed by the recent terrible accident on the Southern Michigan Railroad, exceeds fifty—more, it is stated, than by any railway accident in our country. Others still, it is supposed, were drowned, unseen. An iron express safe was broken into fragments by the concussion.

In Maine, Mr. Smith, the Buchanan candidate, was nominated for Governor, and four Charleston Convention Delegates were appointed, 2 Administration and 2 Anti. The Resolutions try to be on both sides. The leading Democratic paper says that Greeley himself could not write a letter that would do as much harm as Senator Douglas' late letter will.

The Republicans of California have nominated Leland Stanford, of Sacramento, for Governor, Z. F. Kennedy, of Santa Clara, for Lieutenant, and Col. E. D. Baker, of San Francisco, and P. H. Sibley, of Placer, for Congress.

In Vermont, the factions of the Democracy are engaged in a fierce contest. The Administration party are facetiously dubbed "cow-boys," and the Douglassites rejoice in the euphonious appellation of "stump-tails."

Twenty thousand Widows.—Sir Walter Scott admits that the battle of Waterloo created in the British Empire fifteen thousand widows. It is probable that the recent battle of Magenta has created twenty thousand widows and sixty thousand orphans.

The storm, Wednesday of last week, blew down the barn and unroofed the house of Samuel Ebelert, near Milton. Mr. Heinen, D. L. Irland, and Mr. Chalmers, also suffered by the destruction of fruit trees, fences, timber, &c. Blomberg and Middleburg papers notice similar losses.

The barn of Mr. Kepner, near Pinegrove, in Center county, was struck by lightning, and burned down. Some of the papers already notice an increase of insect-eating birds, and a corresponding decrease of the worms that infest vegetation.

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In North Carolina the old British laws of branding, whipping, &c., are still in force. It being a good Democratic State, the federal Buchanan papers don't complain at this treatment of their poor white brethren there!

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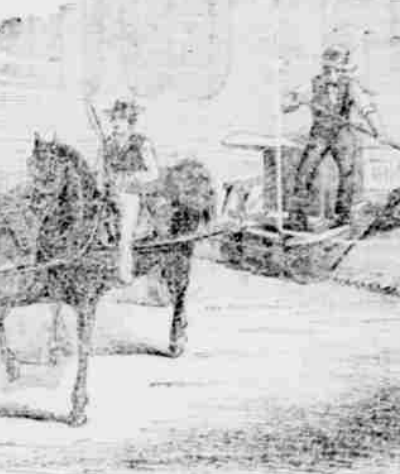

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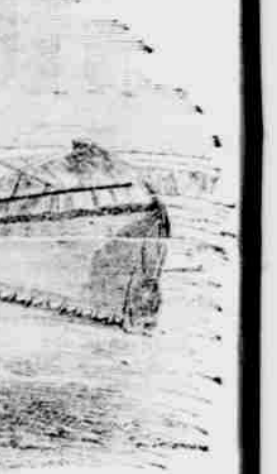
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
