REDUCTION OF THE STATE DEBT-- Gov. Parker officially announces that the State debt has been reduced by the cancellation of bonds and relief issues, to the amount of \$1,137,155 35. This has been done from Nov. 13th 58, 1857, to September 5, 1859. A steady reduction has been going on since the sale of the Public Works, which must be cause of rejoicing to the taxpayers of our good old Commonwealth. At this rate it will not be many years until our State is free of debt. The policy commenced by Gov. Johnson, furthered by Gov. Pollock, and continued by Gov. Parker, is a happy thing to all concerned.

The Leavenworth Daily Register announces the election of B. Gray, as County Judge of Wyandotte county, Kansas, by 19 majority over P. Sidney Post, Esq., the partner of U. S. District Attorney Davis. The Register says the issue was fairly made on the new Constitution--Gray being in favor of its adoption, and Post against it. Wyandotte has hitherto been strongly Democratic. The returns of late local elections in Kansas generally show decided gains for the Republican side, and there is little doubt that the Wyandotte Constitution to be voted on by the people, on the 4th of October, will be ratified by a large majority, in spite of the united and determined opposition of the Democrats.
