By the night mails via Catawissa and Milton to Williamsport, and the morning mails from Williamsport down, half a day earlier news is had in Lewisburg from Philadelphia and New York.

The protracted meeting of the Lewisburg Lutheran church closed on Monday evening last. There have been 66 additions to their church during their revival, embracing persons from 14 to 70 years of age.

A bill has passed both branches of the Nebraska Legislature, and is approved by Gov. Black, appointing a Convention to frame a State Constitution.

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Dr. Livingstone writes from Africa that he has discovered a real highland region, where the inhabitants cultivate cotton very extensively.

Boston, Jan. 18--The birthday of Franklin was commemorated last evening by the Franklin Typographical Society.

The New York Tribune (Grecory) and New York Independent (Becher), are increasing their subscription lists by the thousand this month.

Clark B. Cochrane, M. C. (a relative of Gerrit Smith) has been taken to the Asylum at Utica, and it is believed that prompt treatment has prevented his insanity.

The Opposition members of the Tennessee Legislature have nominated John Bell, as a Candidate for the Presidency.

Senator Mason appears in the Senate Chamber clothed in a gray suit of homespun cloth. The white and black mixture has been selected, we presume, as appropriate to the sectional principles of his party.

On the 8th Oct. last, the American ship Flora Temple, of Baltimore, was wrecked in the China Sea, and--(to be related)--\$50 Chinese and 18 Europeans were left by the Captain and a few men in boats.

Rev. Dr. Robert J. Brockbridge has addressed a letter to his nephew, the Vice President, in which he says the slavery question can never divide this Union.

The Cincinnati Enquirer says that if Douglas is to be killed off for entertaining such views as he does, the entire Northern Democracy must, for entertaining the same views, be killed off too.

Hon. Oliver C. Comstock, M. D., while serving as a Member of Congress in Washington City, about 1820, was converted, and united with the Baptist church, in which he was an able preacher and pastor until his death, last month, at the good old age of 76 years.

YANKEE CLOCKMAKERS--The clock business, previously transacted by Chauncey Jerome & Co., is now done by the New Haven Clock Company.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 28--The steamer A. D. Tyler, with a cargo of 500 tons, from Cincinnati, bound to New Orleans, sank yesterday, in thirteen feet of water, near Cincinnati.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 28--The State Senate yesterday passed all of the Baltimore police bills. Their passage in the House will doubtless be consummated early next week.

ALBANY, JAN. 27--Gov. Morgan has sent a communication to the State Legislature, suggesting an invitation to the State Legislatures of Kentucky and Tennessee, (then visiting the Capital of Ohio) to visit Albany.

ALBANY, N. Y. Jan. 31--Joshua R. Giddings passed through here to night en route for Washington, to testify before the Harper's Ferry Committee.

ALBANY, Jan. 31--The Republican State Convention will meet at Syracuse on the 19th of April, to choose Delegates to the National Convention.

It is stated that Father Chiquoy and about two-thirds of his congregation have associated with the O. S. Presbyterians and the remaining third with the Baptists.

Rev. Dr. Nelson, of the First Presbyterian Church, St. Louis, Mo., preached on Thanksgiving Day, an able and eloquent sermon in behalf of emancipation in that State.

One of the confederates of Georgia, as many as two hundred and seventy-five lashes upon the bare back have been administered to persons charged with entertaining opinions hostile to slavery.

POST OFFICE ROBBER SENTENCED--Joseph Sweizer, convicted of robbing the Post Office at Delaware city, Del., has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment, at hard labor.

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News Items from Other Counties.

The new M. E. Church in Shamokin is to be dedicated on Sunday next.

The Scarlet Fever continues to delatolate the homes of people in various sections of the State. In one township of Jefferson county, twenty-five children have died within a period of two months, and the disease, instead of abating, appears to be increasing, whole families of children being prostrated with it.

The Pottery establishment of John Hicks, in Bloomsburg, has been destroyed by fire.

Dr. John W. Rhoads has opened a Drug Store on Mill street in Danville.

Rev. Peter Cartright, the pioneer of Methodism in the West, recently lectured to a large audience in Harrisburg.

KILLED--A man named Jesse Glafelter, residing near York, on the line of the Northern Central Railroad, was recently killed by a horse on the head, about the temple, and immediately killed.

CHILDREN BURNED--In Mifflin county, the house of Michael Garriz was burned with all its contents, and two children perished in the flames. Two other children, a little boy and girl, made their escape by leaping from the second story window to the ground.

Col. J. P. Caburn of Ansonburg, and A. C. Towner have been admitted to the Bar of Center county.

HARRISBURG, Jan. 28--The remains of Prof. James P. Espy were brought to this place, yesterday afternoon, from Cincinnati, and interred in Mount Kalmia Cemetery. He was a brother of J. S. Espy, Esq., and was formerly a resident of Harrisburg.

The Fuller church in Turbut township, on the site of the old house, was dedicated on Sunday the 22d ult.

On the 17th ult., as Wilson Irvin, his wife, and three children, were riding around the head of the pike, east of the borough of Unionville, by some mischance the vehicle in which they were seated was turned over the bank, and one child instantly killed by having its head crushed.

A Republican Club has been formed in Middleburg, Snyder county. (Ahead of Union county this time.)
