Excitement: Two book peddlers, suspected of being abolition emissaries, were a few days since arrested in Enterprise, Mississippi, brought for trial before the local authorities, and acquitted.

G. W. Vestal, charged with circulating the G. W. Vestal book, tried at Charlem county N. C., last week, was acquitted for want of evidence.

Rev. Mr. House, Methodist, has got himself into trouble in Harrison county, Mo., by preaching abolitionism, and inciting slaves to insurrection.

Mr. Shaller, a German, of Lagrange, Mo., was recently whipped almost to death, on suspicion of not being sound on the slavery question.

Masses: Editors: I observe that the Supplement to the McCall Bill has passed the Legislature. This will be gratifying news to the people of the townships interested in this road.

The Legislature having adjourned, it is no more than justice to say that the Senator and Representatives of Union county have this year distinguished themselves for faithful devotion to her interests.

The only exception we recall is the Railroad Bill in which Col. Wagnessell did not vote and labor as his Union county friends desired of him.

Early Tomatoes: The following is touched for by a gentleman who says he knows it "all right." Cut it out and save it, and at the proper time try the experiment:

About the first of April, take a few large turnips and cut out the hearts of them to form a sort of cup. Fill the cavities with earth. When the seeds have well sprouted, pull up all but the healthiest plant in each row.

Wm. Farrarsworth of Jersey Shore, left home on Thursday week, since which time he has not been heard from.
