**TWO** Cavalry troops, and two Infantry corps, composed the Battalion at Mifflinburg, Saturday last. There were quite a crowd--drenching showers--and much drunkenness--one boy, and one horse, were stabbed, by "sentinels," but neither was very seriously injured.

**SNDYR COUNTY**--A Ratification Meeting at Middlebury, 23d ult., was addressed by Messrs. Waggoner and Van Gezer. And on the 28th, was formed the Lincoln, Hamlin & Curtis Club, No. 1, of Franklin Tp., Snyder Co. Officers--President, Jacob P. Bogar; Vice-President, Joseph Bowersox; Rec'd Sec'y--Andrew J. Peters; Gov't Sec'y--Joseph Young; Treasurer--J. S. Hackenburg.

**Last Saturday**, the inhabitants of Muser's Valley, in Snyder county, sustained quite a loss by a storm of hail. The Penns Creek Valley on the Union county side, also suffered considerably, window glass being broken in Laurelton, grain blown down, and fruit knocked off in many places. The barn of John Smith, Hartley Tp., was unroofed.

An enthusiastic Ratification Meeting was held in Mifflinburg, Saturday evening last--T. Gudelin, President; J. Crossgrave, and Wm. Hauck, Vice Presidents; W. Townsend and David Mitchell, Secretaries. The meeting was addressed at length by Wm. Vangezer, Esq., and by Mr. Mayer--Song by some young ladies--Music by the Mifflinburg Band--Resolution in favor of the Chicago Platform, Lincoln and Hamlin, and a Committee was appointed (Messrs. Smith, Hendricks, Townsend, Rishel and Deckard,) to prepare a Constitution and By-Laws for a Lincoln, Hamlin, & Curtis Club.

We noticed among our general news items some time since, that "Dr. Hayes" was about to make another trip away to the Arctic Ocean. Many inferred in this region that Dr. Wm. Hayes of Lewisburg was referred to--but this is incorrect. The name of the Arctic explorer is Dr. Isaac L. Hayes, of Philadelphia, we believe, who spent one winter in that region with Dr. Kane--lost a foot by frost--and is alive and pushing for another contest with the frozen North, to wrest from its sullen chills the secret of its physical configuration.

We were unable to attend the Sunday School Convention at Mifflinburg on Monday, but understand they enjoyed a pleasant season--A. Swineford, Esq. President, and M. B. Chambers, Secretary. The Lewisburg, New Berlin and Mifflinburg Schools, were all or mostly represented, but not all the country schools. Addresses were made by Rev. Messrs. Mirek, Fink, and Marr, by the President, and by Mr. Chambers. Mr. Heckendorf was continued as corresponding secretary, or active agent. There was a crowded audience in the evening. Good singing by the scholars, and by the choir. The next session to be in New Berlin.
