**Republican Nominating Election.**  
In accordance with the call of the Union County Republican Standing Committee, the election of Candidates for Congress, Assembly and County Offices took place on Saturday last. The election passed off quietly, and a degree of harmony existed seldom witnessed at the polls. Considering that it was but a primary election, the vote was as full as was anticipated.

On Monday, the 6th inst., the Return Judges of the several districts met at the Court House in Lewisburg at 10 o'clock A. M., when Wm. P. Dougall of Kelly township was elected President of the Convention and William L. Harris and John B. Linn Secretaries. The roll of the several Districts was then called, and the following Return Judge answered thereto:

The convention then proceeded to receive and add up the returns of the several Election Districts, for the candidates to be supported at the ensuing Fall election for the several county offices making the following aggregate result:

On motion it was Resolved, That it be recommended to the Standing Committee to change the hours of holding election in country from 2 P. M. to 5 P. M. to from 4 P. M. to 7 P. M.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the nominee for Assembly be allowed to select his own Conference to meet at Fremont, Snyder county, on Thursday the 23d day of August, 1860.

On motion, the following Congressional Conferences were appointed to meet those from Dauphin, Lebanon, &c., to nominate a candidate for Congress, to meet at Georgetown, Northumberland county, on Friday the 24th day of August, 1860: Johnson Walls; Thomas Gutelius; John B. Linn.

The following Conferences were appointed to select a Representative Delegate to the State Convention: Theodore S. Christ, James Marshall, Frederick Smith.

"As no person had solicited the office of Auditor previous to the day of election, several gentlemen in different districts allowed their names to be used for that office, merely for the purpose of completing the ticket. Mr. Shaffer, of the North Ward, Lewisburg, having the highest number of votes, we deem it unnecessary to give the others—Ed."

The following Conferences were appointed to Select a Senatorial Delegate to the next State Convention: John B. Linn, Wm. L. Harris, Francis Wilson.

On motion, J. M. Moyer, was invited to address the Convention; after a brief and stirring address by Mr. Moyer, it was Resolved, That the proceedings signed by the officers be published in the Republican papers of the county.
