Friday Morning, Aug. 31, 1890. A... We received a communication from 'A Citizen,' which we regret we can not publish on account of its length, advocating the establishment of a High School in Lewisburg, in which the languages and higher mathematics could be taught. We give below a synopsis of the reasons upon which the argument is based, but can not find room for the main portion of the communication. The reasons are--

1. It would give greater interest to the schools. 2. It would afford the same advantages to the children of the poor that the children of the more wealthy have afforded them under other circumstances. 3. It would be a great saving to such persons who are deterred, at every preparation, to give their children a liberal education, and who can hardly spare the means to do it with.
