

TUESDAY, OCT. 9, is Election-Day... Turn Out!

Mass Meeting! Lewisburg, Friday, Oct. 5.

SENATOR LANDON, who is expected to speak first to-day, had the reputation in 1851 of being the most effective orator in the Union...

Very little special effort has been made for our Mass Meeting, (Friday.) A rousing, spontaneous gathering, under the circumstances, will indicate that the people are wide-awake, and alive to the importance of the Oct. Election.

The Democrats are putting forth unusual efforts for their circulars, persistent personal entreaties, &c.

Think of it! We preserved, and have before us, at the Star & Chronicle office, a handbill for a Democratic meeting at Millburg, Saturday, Oct. 4, 1856, which reads thus:

Previous to and since that time, Democrats have had ample time and power to prove their decision to "Freedom for Kansas."

By abolishing the Missouri Compact, and reopening the North-West to Slavery--by their wicked war to Africanize the free soil--by devastating and murdering anti-slavery settlers, burning houses, destroying presses of freemen--by stuffing ballot-boxes--by the Leontopium Constitution, offering to admit Kansas at once as a Slave State, but keeping her out of the Union...

It is that "laboring for FREEDOM for Kansas," what "laboring for SLAVERY for Kansas" be? Will men of common sense be cheated again?

THE TONNAGE TAX--The nomination of Henry D. Foster, late attorney for the Pennsylvania Railroad, for Governor, and the fact that Wm. A. Stokes, the railroad's present principal attorney, is working for him, betoken that an effort will be made to repeal the tonnage tax next winter.

One of the candidates for State Attorney in Illinois, and one of the Breckinridge candidates for Electors in New York, have come out openly for Lincoln. The Democracy can't even be sure their own candidates are with them.

The Ball meetings in Pennsylvania are chiefly got up by dealers in the Southern trade, and their numbers swelled by Douglas and Breckinridge men. It is well understood, among them all, to be a "dodge" for effect.

It is impossible to keep up with the accounts of the mass meetings of Lincoln's friends in Pennsylvania and other States. They seem to excel any other, both in spirit and in numbers. They certainly indicate the popular sympathy and intentions.

SECTIONAL--The Convention which nominated Lincoln, represented much more of the whole nation than that of Douglas, Breckinridge, Bell or Sumner. In fact, Lincoln's was the most "National" of all the Conventions. Were the Rights of Men sinned under a Slave despotism, every State would have been fully represented. It was only rarer, and not choice, that made any seats vacant at Chicago.

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The German Orator.

A writer in the London (Penn.) Times, of the 8th ult., gives an interesting sketch of the life of CARL SCHUEZ. He was born 32 years ago, in Bonn, on the Rhine, in the Prussian Dominion. In 1819, he joined the Constitutional army, and, sharing in its reverses, was sentenced to death for high treason. For three days and nights, after the Prussians had entered Rastadt, he lay concealed in a shed, on a beam or rafter, just wide enough to conceal his person from the eyes of those who stood below.

Gen. Foster may be a pretty good circulator, as he stands on Doug & Breck, Free Trade & the Tariff, at the same time. Yet it is an old proverb, "Between two stools, one comes to the ground."

Samuel Knorr, Esq. of Bloomsburg, last week gave in his address to the Republicans, and told his old Democratic friends the reason. They do say in Columbia county, "the Republican nominee for Senator is BOUND TO GO."

Some of the Democratic editors have not yet heard of the Election in Maine, where they united on a SMART man for Governor, and were going to carry it--like Pennsylvania! Is it not shameful that men pretending to give their patrons news, should exclude from them the fact of their unparalysed flagging in Maine?

Both the friends and foes of Col. Forney, admit that he is a sagacious politician. He says nothing can prevent Lincoln's election but the withdrawal and caving in of Breck, and that unless Foster comes out square for Douglas he also is doomed--No doubt of it.

Col. Tate, who was running two candidates for President, has dropped one, (Douglas), and is trying to make time with Breck only. Some Dem. Editors have two yet, and some--more sensible--have none: "no use in trying."

Remember--Gen. Foster is one of the men who made speeches in 1844 and hurraed for "Polk, Dallas and the Tariff of '42," and has ever since aided in keeping up the swindling free-trade Democratic party.
