PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION, Tuesday, Nov. 6, 1860.

Table showing Union County Reports for the Presidential Election of 1860, listing candidates and their respective votes.

Union County has done nobly. With a decreased vote, she has increased her majority 200 on Fusion, and come up to the mark.

The other district to hear from will probably leave Union County with 1000 majority for Lincoln over Fusion, and perhaps 1000 over all—a gain of 200.

Snyder county, 650 for Lincoln—100 gain. Montour and Luzerne, major, for Lincoln.

Lycoming gives Lincoln a gain of 300. Northumberland Co. rep. do 500. Clinton Center and Millin, each 300 gain for Lin.

The following are reported pluralities for Lincoln over Fusion or Reading Ticket: Philadelphia 17,000—Allegany 10,000—Lancaster 8,000—Erie 4,000—Lebanon 1,700—Dauphin 1600—Berks 67—Chester 3000, Hanover 1500, Carbon 150, Susquehanna 2000, Wayne 300, etc.

The different States are reported this (Thursday) afternoon as follows: For LINCOLN. MAINE 25,000. NEW HAMPSHIRE 10,000. VERMONT 27,000.

For BELL. Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee. For BRECKINRIDGE. Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina (Legislature voted), Georgia and Alabama.

For SMITH. None—unless Upper Canada! Bell may get Louisiana and Texas. Breckinridge will probably receive Florida, Mississippi and Arkansas.

Which is "Sectional"?—We do not see that the Northern man, Lincoln, has been given a single Southern State—not one—they are so "sectional."—But we of the North, in our generosity and "nationality," appear to have given the Fusionists the South one of our Sovereign States—New Jersey—by a respectable majority.

Forty-nine towns of Maine give Lincoln 17,320, Douglas 7,613, Breckinridge 1,709, Bell and Everett 806. Thus far there is 4,018 Republican gain over the September election.

The Illinois Legislature is Republican. Delaware gives Breck 2000 maj. Breckinridge men do not give up Virginia, Kentucky, or Louisiana.

Lincoln has 16 votes in Alexandria, and 4 in Portsmouth, Virginia. The Illinois Legislature is Republican. Delaware gives Breck 2000 maj.

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Wilmington, Del., Nov. 6.—The 5th Ward gives a plurality for Lincoln. Fisher (Rep.) has 40 majority for Congress.
