While not paying one quarter of the Revenues, the South has always had twothirds of the Offices, and the best ones at that.

The Slave States have millions of acres of the best lands, unopened-more fresh territory than the Free States-the best lands, harbors, and climate. She has already room for all her Negroes, for scores of years to come, if they will but cultivate the soil, and not skin and desert it.

There is still another striking instance of the grievous wrong the South has suffered at the hands of the Free States, and one which the doughface press will find a powerful argument to support them in their war against the North. We refer to the vast sums the Government has paid for the purchase of territory mainly converted into Siave Stares, and in the prosecution of the Fiorida and Mexican wars, both of which were for the benefit of Slavery.
