TARIFF BILL PASSED!—It affords us pleasure to record the passage of the Tariff Bill, in the United States Senate, by a vote of 25 yeas to 14 nays, and here we particularly call attention to the fact, that of the 25 yeas, twenty-four are Republicans, and only one (Mr. Bigler, of this State,) a Democrat.

P. S.—Wed., the "Peace Congress" adjourned, in good humor, after adopting the proposed Constitutional Amendments of Thos. E. Franklin of Penn., which they request Congress to submit to the States.

Both the Railroad Bills have passed to third reading in the Penn. Senate. As Gov. Curtin was understood to be nominated by the friends of those two interests, we have no hope that he will interpose his power to save the people or his party from the evil those "twins" will inflict.

Last year, however, the Republicans in the New York Legislature passed some very obnoxious measures, which Gov. Morgan vetoed. The consequence was, that the people revenged themselves upon the party, but upon the individuals who did the wrong. They re-elected the Governor, by an increased majority—being the only man thus honored by a reelection in twenty years.
