From Tennessee.

CHICAGO, March 25.—The Nashville correspondent of the Times has arrived at Cairo.

Gov. Johnson has put newspapers under military rule, and suppressed one or two. He has issued a proclamation of a conciliatory character. He says he desires to win the people back to the Union, but shall deal vigorously with treason. Mr. Etheridge had made a speech, in which he said that "Slavery would be abolished if we could not conquer them any other way." The new government was to go into operation next week. Warning has been given that any one uttering treason, will be arrested. The Union feeling is gaining ground; business is pretty much resumed; all the stores are again opened, and prices have been much reduced.

At Centerville, part of the Rebel fortifications were mounted with "Quaker cannon," (maple logs, painted black.) These works, and those at Manasses, should have been captured last fall, together with a large part of the Rebel forces and material. McClellan's useless delay has cost the country \$300,000,000, at least. This was "splendid strategy" against the Treasury. —Honest Democrat.

Micajah Phillips died recently at Marietta, Ohio, aged about one hundred and twenty years. He was a slave of Rev. Mr. Fountain, and a waiter in the Army when Yorktown was captured. Afterwards he was with Blennerhasset on the Ohio, until he died. Mrs. Blennerhasset taught him to read and write, and he preached to the colored population of Parkersburg, Va., as a member of the Baptist church.

Hon. H. D. Maxwell has been appointed Judge of the Third Judicial district, vice Judge Finlay, resigned. The appointment was urged on Gov. Curtin by unanimous application of the legal profession of the District.
