Our losses are severe-probably 800 to 1,000 killed, 2,000 to 3,000 wounded, and 1,000 missing-5 000 in all. The Rebels must have lost double that number, as our artillery and gunboats mowed them at every step. The brave Brig Gen. Wm.
