From the Slifer Guards. CAMP NEAR FALMOUTH, VA. ) Wed., May 14, 1862.

On the 13th ult., our Regiment was ordered to guard the Orange & Alexandria Railroad from Alexandria to Manassas Junction, and were engaged in that occupation up to the 7th inst., when we were ordered to pack up and be ready to leave by train. Accordingly, 1 2 o'clock, P. M. of said day, we were all embarked and on our way to Catlet Station (eleven miles beyond Manassas,) which place we reached at 61, P. M., and encomped. On the morning of the 9th, at 6 o'clock, we left Catlet, and marched 10; miles towards Falmouth, halted, and encamped in the woods. Took up our line of march the following morning (10th,) at 5; o'clock, and baited and encamped at 10, A. M. having traveled within eight miles of Falmouth. By 6 o'clock on the morning of the 11th, we were again formed in line, and marched two miles north-east of Falmouth. Here we halted, and laid out our camp according to army regulations; and in all the Company Streets, we have trees making a shade which is quite pleasant, I assure you.
