Great Battle of Cedar Run Mountain.

Last Sunday (the 12th) of the month, an advanced force of Gen Pope's Union army, under Gen Brady, met the army of "Stonewall" Jackson, Ewell, and others, at a place called Cedar Run, or Slaughter Mountain, somewhere between Galpher C.H. and the Rapidan river, in General Virginia. The enemy greatly outnumbered that portion of our army engaged, were well posted, and for a time drove our men back. Our artillery came to the rescue, and although the Rebels moved their solid columns before it, and were defeated, they were mowed down by our shells, and the Union army kept the field. Sunday, each side was under arms, but only a small skirmish resulted. Monday, Jackson sent a flag of truce for permission to bury his dead. Tuesday, Gen. Pope telegraphed that Jackson was retreating over the Rapidan, towards Gordonsville and Richmond, but was harassed by our cavalry and artillery, under Buford. The enemy burned bridges behind them, and showed signs of disaster and fear.
