Col. John J. Patterson has been elected. He was elected to the Legislature from the Representative district of Union, Snyder and Juniata, two terms, receiving a larger majority at his second than at his first election. The secret of his popularity is that he never betrayed the confidence of his constituents. When the question of the Repeal of the Tonnage Tax was agitated, Patterson pledged himself against it. He voted against the Repeal--the money of the Company, to which many of the Members fell victims, could not overcome his integrity. Dare his opponents deny this? If they charge Col. Patterson with corruption, this fact ought to make them blush--Snyder Gazette.

BE WARNED!--Probably a hundred thousand Pennsylvanians today mourn, in the bitterness of their souls, that they voted for Mr. Buchanan for President, and ask God to forgive them that blunder. His election would beheadled in Richmond, and wherever this Union is hated, as a blow against the existing Government, and in favor of Secession.

ONE WITH HIS HEAD!--The following incident is one of many proving that there are among our army many men who wish and hope to thwart our forces and worry the North into submission to the Slave Power. We do not put Gen. McClellan in that class, but the man named only proved the *folly* among some of our officers, who, when in power, disgracefully surrender as Miles did at Harper's Ferry.

MAJ. JOHN RAY, of Allentown Aid-Camp to Maj. Gen. Halleck, has been dismissed from the service, for the utterance of disloyal sentiments. Maj. Ray is reported to have said, in answer to the question why McClellan did not move on the Rebels and crush them, on the day following the great battle of Antietam, "because that was not the programme. The programme is to prolong the war until the next Presidential election, and then settle it with the Rebels on Democratic principles!" The President summoned him, and, he not being able to justify his remarks, he was discharged. This is regarded as an excellent example in high quarters, and it is hoped the army may be thoroughly purged of those who utter treasonable words. Maj. Ray bore a fair character as an officer, but, as he had been assigned to Gen. Halleck's staff without his being previously known to the General, he was not trusted confidentially.

What Claim?--Except his wealth and his "outgoing word" as a born politician, what has Wm. Miller to recommend him to Congress in this momentous era? He has no legislative experience, and his past career was with those, now leaders of the Rebellion. Is he to be trusted? Says the *Snyder Gazette*,

"As the son of Jesse Miller, who, in the office of Canal Commissioner, made a fortune at the State's expense, he is not entitled in any great degree to the favor or gratitude of our people. Probably his holding the office of Prothonotary of the Supreme Court, at the present time, worth \$1500 a year, gives him a claim to our votes; we can't see that it does! He is now Attorney at Harrisburg, for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and in that capacity was very active in BORING FOR THE REPEAL OF THE TONNAGE TAX, and has done that which has done for him. We hardly believe that the people will think that it does!"
