## The Tide is turning!

"The Darkest Hour is just before Day."

During last week, the Rebels under Gen. Van Dorn, Price, and Hurler, made a fierce attack upon Gen. Rosecrans, at Corinth, but were driven back with much slaughter, and pursued some days. Many prisoners were taken, and the enemy greatly demoralized.

Gen. Schofield and Merrill are using the Rebels in Missouri very roughly at different points.

It is thought the Rebel army in Virginia is now pretty much in the Shenandoah Valley, and that they have lost by death, wounds, starvation and desertion, some twenty thousand men.

The iron-clad steamers are rapidly preparing to complete the capture of the remaining Southern States held by the Rebels, when their numbers are so small that they are almost certain to be destroyed.

The recent bold efforts of the Rebels is a complete disaster. They see the end of their Empire coming upon them in a few weeks.

Price, Lincoln, has been visiting our armies around Harper's Ferry, and has been most enthusiastically received by the men.

Lincoln's last Declaration is exactly a "renewal" to the Rebels. They see the "dark writing on the wall" and are at their wits' end to know "what to do about it."

Gen. Sherman, and Gen. Sherman, returned to the army this week.

Henry Mosser, Jr., one of three brothers from New Berlin, was mortally wounded at South Mountain, and was buried, last Sunday, at this place.

Albert Snyder, the first of the Wall Guards who died of wounds received in action, was buried in Milton, Wednesday.

Also Mr. Foster, a wounded Volunteer, from near Millersburg.

Capt. Major, Lieut. Ammons and Mr. Wiegart, have returned home, suffering from recent severe illness.

Hon. Joseph Bell, Congressman from Perry, Cumberland and York, voted so often for the War measures of the Administration, that they with the Douglas men of the district intend to re-elect him.

The Rebels prefer to have Gladstone—his course would help them, by crossing the Administration, like Vallandigham.
