Friday, the 9th inst., our fleet proceeded up the Arkansas river, and next morning disembarked two miles below the Post, which is on the north bank of the river six miles from its mouth.

Formed in line of battle, and at 12 M. our regiment took the advance, and after an hour's brisk skirmishing the rebels were driven from their rifle pits, and compelled to take refuge in their main fort losing several wounded.

We kept advancing, and an abrupt bend in the river suddenly brought us facing the muzzle of a 64 pounder frowning upon us not four hundred yards distant, that soon spoke in tones that told us our presence was anything but welcome.

They lurid glare, shot and canister at us for half an hour, but we fell on our faces and it went crashing through the trees hurting no one. Just at dark the gunboats moved up and opened on the fort, and kept up an awful cannonading for an hour; and such a spectacle as that presented the imagination only can picture.

Meantime the infantry was surrounding the fort. Owing to the low, swampy ground, the artillery could not be got into position until about 12 o'clock Sunday. At half past twelve it opened on them from all points, while the infantry charged their works, and after three hours and fifteen minutes hard fighting they struck their colors and ran up the white flag; and the fort, with 13 pieces of artillery, 6,500 stands of small arms and 5,200 prisoners, including Gen. Churchill was ours.

There were nine regiments, all Texas except one, an Arkansas regiment, and the best marksmen. They had arms of every description, but most very good. They had three inch columbiads in bomb proof casements, and two Parrott guns. The columbiads were dismounted and broken to pieces, as if they had been stones. I am unable to give the correct estimate of the loss on either side, but ours is much the heavier, being the attacking party, and they having the advantage of the breastworks.

We had not more than fifteen regiments engaged. All fought gallantly except one regiment, the 26th Iowa, but it was the first time that it was ever under fire. Our (8th Missouri) fought three hours within 15 yards of their breastwork, and were just being ordered back for ammunition when the surrender was made. In front of us were three guns, which we held there three hours keeping them from firing a shot, while several artillerists were killed, and at one gun lay twelve dead horses, at the other nine, and at the third four. The loss of our regiment was five killed and twenty-nine wounded. W. R.

INCONSISTENT--A movement is being made by Democrats in this city, to prevent the enlistment of colored men in the proposed colored brigade. When the rebellion first assumed the shape of a bloody war, these fellows were very earnest in declaring that, "the nigger was the cause of the fight, the nigger should do the fighting." When a proposition was made to enlist negroes in the army, the cry was raised that the war was for abolition purposes. Now that negroes can enter a specified portion of that army, the Democracy are persuading the African that he has no interest in the conflict, and should therefore not enlist. The fact is worth being known, if only to show the shifts of the hatternauts--Harrisburg Telegraph. [Harrisburg can and should furnish some good colored soldiers.]

A New Orleans letter gives the following instructive fact: "I have just met an old friend, whom I not only find a loyal man, but actively engaged in aiding the Government. His father owned the estate on the river, below the city, known as the 'Magnolia estate'--the large brick building looking, with the sugar mill, like a village on the banks of the river, as we came up. He says he is hiring the negroes by the month, and they work day and night in the cane, in this, the most driving work of plantation work. They need no urging; they work too much. He says the large hospital he has for the sick negroes, which was always sure to be filled at this season, is now without a tenant, and all are over-anxious to work."

AN ANCIENT BIBLE--S. B. Boyer, Esq., of this place, came into possession of a German Bible last week, published at Frankfurt-on-the-Main, by Christian Egenolf, on the 1st day of March, 1534. Mr. Boyer purchased this ancient and valuable relic of J. C. Mann, below Chambersburg, which he first saw while there on duty as one of the Pennsylvania Militia in September last.
