#### The Wails of "Dry-Land Sailors."

Correspondence of the Star & Chron-OFF PORT ROYAL, S.C., Feb.S.

Three weeks will elapse, to-morrow, since I, along with other deluded victims of our country's circumstances, first took the plank for our present destination. I mean the embarkation at Beaufort, North Carolina. Three dreary weeks, like pigs in a pen have we rolled in our berths. trusting that providence would deliver us from so great a bondage. Ten days, we lay in the harbor at Beaufort, awaiting embarkation of the rest of the expedition; then, two or three more employed in steering our tub to Port Royal S. C.; and now, for more than a week, we have ing orders to disembark. Our passage down was rough and stormy, the ocean swells frequently sweeping our forward deck and flinging the spray over everything and everybody on it, while men and officers at blockade there was over raised. 
