Mr. STERLING, Ky., April 7. The Transports came-suddenly. In the morning, before we were up some one bawled into the tent "Strike tents immedistely !" Then there was a burrying to and fro; but we cooled down and took breakfast. "Get ready to move immedintely !" but we leisurely struck tents, as no transports were in sight.

This post, owing to the numerous camps and log huts, and hospitals, was in-fested with rats. After we had pitched our tents at the post, we floored them, and rat hunting was a grand amusement. You could see squads of men about the log houses a'm st any time in the day, with the "General?" (a dog that has followed the Regiment from Annapolis.) and other dogs, rushing about, tearing up the floors, with shouts of laughter and fun. The rats took refuge under our tents. Capt. Hassenplug's was a favorite place. They analyed Foster so much that he couldn't sleep. One located its family right underneath where he usually D. That morning, when the tents were taken down, there were so many that it took the "General" and all the Regiment to hunt them. Field and staff, line and non-com. officers and privates dropped packing and tentstriking and joined in the chase. It was a scene of universal fun. Hassenplug quietly smoked his pipe, looking on, and remarked that they would find 75 thereand it came very near it.

Rat-catching over, tents struck, baggage loaded, we embarked on the Kennebeck; by five o'clock we were off Ft. Monroe, and steamed up the Bay, getting to Baltimore the next day in the afternoon, of Friday. About 3 o'clock, A. M. Saturday, started, passing on the other side of Harrisburg, out the Penn'a Central, reaching Pittsburg 10 o'clock on Sunday. In the evening, left Pittsburg, and passing Conshochton next day, Monday at 10 o'elock, Columbus, Ohio, 5 o'clock P. M. Cincinnati, 2 o'clock P. M., Tuesday. Crossed the Ferry to Covington about 10 o'clock: lefs Covington in the evening and arrived at Paris, Ky, some time in the night. Were there until Friday morning, when we marched to Mt. Sterling, 22 miles, leaving Paris at 9 o'clock, and arriving here about 6 seleck in the

evening. - Passing through Pennsylvania, it was cold and there was snow, and everything looked bleak and cheerless; and nobody came out to see us; and we saw nobody we knew; and were very depressed. We got an idea, somehow, we were going through our homes, when we went through our native State, and however presumptuous, were dranning that we would see the tronage in the future. glad faces of friends at every station, smiling and waving to us, and bidding us "God speed." But no-not a facenot a kindly smile-some shivering mortals trudging along, scarcely deigning to look up at the cars-indeed it was a disappointment, however unreasonable it might be. At l'ittsburg, we were all fed in the public hall, with banners and placards up-"Welcome to Burnside's gallant 9th Army Corps," &c Many places along the route we had coffee and provision Furniture! served. Especially at Columbus, Ohio, they had fine preparations, but it was marred by an unfortunate dispute between some of our men and the Provost Guard. Our men have, perhaps wrongly, an idea that they can do as they please wherever they go, and have an utter contempt for the troops that remain in their native States. They tried to pass up the street from \$3 to \$66-(20 different patterns and latest styles -the guard resisted: the officers shot some of our men with their revolvers, and some few muskets were discharged. One of our men was killed and four of the 21st Mass. wounded. I can say truly there was there very little drunkenness as alledged in the papers; and as to the officers standing looking on, it was done so quick, and in such a way, that none appeared to appreciate what was going on. At Cincinnati, they fed us splendidly in the Market House, and we marched past the Burnet House, where Gen. Burnside, in citizens' dress, with an enormous black eilk hat, looking on the whole like a sign for a Jew clothing store, simply said that we had always done what he had asked us to do-he was very happy to have command over us again-and we cheered, and J. M. L. marched away.
