Bloody Affray in New Berlin. We learn that one James Hammel, son of Benjamin of Middlecreek Twp, Snyter Co, entered the 172d Reg , P. M., as a substitute, was sworn in-deserted-and has since defied the law. Last Saturday noon, he was attending the funeral of his sister, in the Ger. Ret. and Luth. house at New Berlin, when Mr. Gebhart of the U.S. army, with J Smith of Middleburg, entered the room, came to Hummel, and required him to surrender. The deserter replied by drawing a pistol and shooting at the officer, who returned the fire against the practical aid of the Robels in arms. desperado, and several shots were exchanged. Hummel's friends rushed upon the officer, and the deserter was hurried away in a buggey by his brother. Officer Geb bart has two bullet holes in his overcoat, and had one finger hurt. Deserter Hummel is reported to have a bullet in his left breast, and his recovery is much doubted. None others were hurt, but the excitement was naturally intense.

3d, That all orders issued by the Street Commissioners and also by the Overseers of the Poor, be presented, by the boilers thereof, to the Town Council for approval, and thereupon a borough order, properly attested, he issued to the said holder for said amount, and proper officer, to be accounted for in his settlement with said Borough

4th, That this act is to take effect, and go into operation, at the time of the organiza and election of the Officers of the said Town Council for the ensuing year.
