But a greater triumph than all this has been gained. The people in the counties visited have had a good look at live Yankees and found them neither savages nor bandits. Thanks to the good management of the Commanding General, the people whom be visited will have but little cause of complaint at the invasion. Private property and private persons were nowhere interfered with, except in such cases as are recognized by all civilized nations. The people at the same time were astounded and gratified; astounded in the first instance to see a Yankee force in their midst, and gratified to see us a civilized people. They could not restrain their tears

when they saw the dear old flag again. The negroes joined the column in flocks, and begged to be taken away. Some of these poor people were so overjoyed that they went into hysterics; others kneeled in the street and prayed, thanking Jesus for sending the Yankees. All these peop'e tell the same story ; their masters had told them that if the Yankees came there they would be sold to Cuba, branded, and many of them would be murdered in cold blood. They did not believe it. The negroes everywhere gave valuable information and acted as quides.
