Deserters are Felons at Common Law.

It would I e well, if those who have deserted from the army, better understand the position they occupy. These who at tempt to resist an arrest, do so at the per il of their lives. We learn from the Philadelphia Ledger, that in the Court of Oyer and Terminer of Berks county, in the trial of an officer and private for shooting a deserter, who attempted to escape, the Judge-Hop. W. J. Woop-WARD, distinctly laid down the law that a deserter is a felon at common law, and that the officer was justified in ordering the guard to fire, rather than permit the escape of the deserter.

We repeat, it would be well for deserters in this county, as well as friends who have been encouraging them to resist an arrest, to bear this fact in mind. And at the loe House below the River Bridge. it should be further remembered that Lewisburg, Nov. 29, 1850 FRANK ANGSTADT every drafted man who has failed to respand, has been decided to be a deserter. He is just as much a felon as the actual desurter, and whatever resistance be makes to an arrest will be at his peril.

The Easton Free Press states that the case of Jacob S. 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
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
