That as the unfortunate divisions among citizens of Loyal States have tended to keep alive the Rebellion another year, we again exhort all who desire a permanent and honorable peace, to unite with us in sustaining the only powers that are engaged in suppressing the unboly and uncalled for Insurrection of the Slave Oligarchy against the most free

and beneficent government on earth. 2. That there can be but two parties in this contest. 4. That the efforts of those whom our brave soldiers in the field style " Copperheads," to belie the facts of this war - to divert attention from the true to false issues -to excite the ignerant to resist the sets of Congress-to shield traitors and sowers of sedition-and to weaken and barass our fleets and armies that the Rebels may at last succeed in enslaving the North as they have the South .... all such efforts are base, and cowardly, and deserve the strongest reprobation of every true American.

5. That a time of war is manifestly very different in its privileges, and Goveramental powers, from a time of peace, and that this feet should by constantly borne in mind. Military necessities often have, and may, override the asfegurds of peaceful days. We do not ask to have the Constitution altered to suit armed Rebels. We are in favor of personal free-dom to all law-abiding men. We trust a truly republican form of Government may be secured to every State. We are in faliberty of the speech and of the press, not only in time of war, at the North, but also in time of peace, at the South, to men of every clime and color. But we are not in favor of traitors preaching destruction to our Government under pretence of liberty, nor that the press and babeus corpus should be prestituted to shield the Breckinridges, the Hughes, the Vallandighams and other undoubted enemies in disguise from the punishments which responsible commanders may judge expedient and essential.

6. That, as they who commence an unjust contest, should pay its costs, we approve formerly acting with the Democratic the Confiscation act; that, as we believe party.
