THE COPPERHEAD LOVE of "FREE SPEECH."—Copperheads are singularly inconsistent. They loudly claim for "Free Speech," and yet have been its most violent opposers, and still bitterly oppose it when that speech is not in their favor. As an illustration: At the demonstration held in New York to denounce the arrest of Vallandigham, and assert the right of free speech, an old gentleman was introduced to the platform, who said:

"Follow Democrats. I am not John Brown—I am not Harriet Greeley—I am not Wendell Phillips—I am no BENEATH of the Herald—I am not Abraham Lincoln—I am a Democrat—a life long Democrat. I never voted for any but a Democrat. Abraham Lincoln did not commence this war [Hisses and applause] South Carolina commenced this war, by attacking Fort Sumter." ["Put him down!"] Amid great confusion, the old man raised his voice and continued, "I am here, to-night, through an invitation of posters all over the city, as a friend of free speech." ["Put him down!"] and in a rough manner the old man was dragged from the rostrum.]

That's the kind of "free speech" the Copperheads favor—at a meeting called, as they say, to protect "free speech." Such scoundrels must think that the people are a set of idiots, and can not see through such glaring inconsistencies.

FEARFUL RECORD—An army officer writes from Louisiana to the Boston Transcript that the camps of the Black regiment in Banks' army are models of neatness and order, and that but one man in the whole command has been punished for misconduct. Never were men seen to fight with more dauntless courage and devotion than these raw recruits. He adds:

"Every man presenting himself to be recruited strips to the skin, to be surveyed by the Surgeon. We do not accept one half that offer. On Tuesday, out of 82, only 33 were accepted. I have directed my Surgeons to keep accurate lists of the causes of rejection. They report to me that not one in fifteen is free from marks of severe lasting. More than half are rejected because of disability arising from lashing with whips and the biting of dogs on their calves and thighs. It is frightful. Hundreds of them have wells on their back as large as one of your largest fingers. I intend to have these men made and exhibited, and published, with certificate of Surgeons."

Some Difference—The correspondents of the N. Y. Tribune captured by the Rebels, are held in captivity in the Libby prison. Vallandigham is feasted, toasted, petted, snuggled out into English ships, and all to aid in dividing the North so as to prolong the War! The South know who are their friends to let loose, and who are their enemies to keep fast. They rightly claim and recognize Val as an efficient ally: he advised, at Newark, N. J., the "invasion of the North," and, following his counsel, eight or ten thousand men were slain, and twice that number wounded, at Gettysburg.

Capt. Patrick O'Malley, 115th Pennsylvania, has been dismissed for drunkenness. Hospital Steward Chas. N. Snyder, U. S. A., has also been dismissed for drunkenness. Col. William Northeridge, 57th N. Y. V., has been dismissed the service for attempting to excite mutiny. The Government want to do no injustice, but they weed out bad men as fast as they safely can.

A correspondent in Leavenworth says that the 1st Kansas Colored Regiment is the best disciplined and most perfectly drilled regiment in the Union service. They were drilling for nine months before the Government would receive them as soldiers. The writer proposes, after the war, a standing army of 100,000 colored soldiers.

A dispatch from Hagerstown says that the rear guard of Lee's army left Martinsburg at 2 o'clock on Saturday morning, a few cavalrymen posted on the other side of the Potomac. Our whole force is across the river. The Potomac is falling rapidly. Gen. Lee is retreating his main force by Strasburg and Staunton, not by Culpeper.

The Catholic Bishop of Iowa, on Sunday week, in a sermon at Dubuque, pointedly denounced the Golden Circle or Copperhead secret organization. He would give those members of the church who had joined the organization, two weeks to leave it, and then, if they still continued in it, they might consider themselves excommunicated.

Gen. Burnside's order denouncing traitors to be shot, and removing rebel sympathizers beyond the rebel lines, has produced a magical change in his department. Men who formerly sported rebel emblems, have quietly removed them, and this government is more respectfully spoken of than before in the barrooms.

They are offering rewards for the recent rioters in New York, recovering property stolen, and holding inquests on the dead. The leading merchants are liberal to the sufferers, and the first lawyers aid colored people in securing their rights. And the draft is to be completed forthwith.

Both the sons of the Hon. Edward Everett—one of whom has just graduated at Cambridge, England—have been drafted in Boston. Both have made up their minds to serve in person, instead of procuring a substitute or paying the \$300.
