Last Hope of the Rebels.

From the Memphis "Daily Appeal," Aug. 10.

Since the fall of Vicksburg, a shadow of gloom seems to have settled upon the countenances of many, and their hopes of triumph have suffered at least a temporary eclipse. A calm and impartial survey of the past, and comparison with our then and our present situation, and a glance at our future prospects, we think can not fail to dispel such despondency.

Within the last twelve months, elements of discord, discontent, and division have sprung up in the North to such an extent that the Anti-slavery party has become respectable and formidable, and bids fair, ere long, to overwhelm the Lincoln Administration and hurl it from power. This is not the least important result of the war's prolongation. The war of the Northern men actually broke up, and this of itself was full compensation for all the reverses we have sustained. If we are discreet in the future, and devote our energies to the destruction of the army which Lincoln now has in our territory, it is our conviction that the Peace party will do most of the fighting that will be required to terminate the war after that. To say that we can not drive off the enemy from our borders, is a humiliating confession, and degrading to our character. In this beliefed men we outshander their forces on our soil three to one, and all that is wanting to drive them from our country, or bury them beneath its sod, is resolution, courage, and determination."
