A Joint Resolution proposing certain NEW GROCERY AND Amendments to the Constitution. BE it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in

accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof. There shall be an additional section to the the third article of the Constitution, to be des-

ignated as section four, as follows:
"Secrion 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requise tion from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are or shall be prescribed by law, as fully and effectually as if they were present at their usual places of election.

There shall be two additional sections the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be

designated as sections eight and nine, as follows
SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title,

except appropriation bills.
Secrets 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers or privileges in any case where the authority to grant such powers or privileges has been or may hereafter be conferred upon the Courts of this Commonwealth. JOHN CESSICA,


