The following expression of sentiments was reported, and adopted unanimously:
Resolved, that we yield a hearty and unqualified support to the Administration of President Lincoln in its policy, foreign and domestic, and extend to the President our warm sympathy in the terrible struggle with armed traitors in the South, and unarmed foes of the Union in the North.

On motion, Messrs. Israel Gatlens of Snyder Co., and Richard Doyle of Juniata Co., were recommended as delegates to the next State Convention.

The Junata Sentinel, and friends from that county, are confident that the late unfortunate divisions of our party there, are cured; they have heard and seen enough of Wm. H. Miller's course, in trying to undermine the Government, (thus aiding the Rebels), and are satisfied the public good demands a sacrifice of all personal feelings for the general welfare.

The Conferees who brought forward Mr. Balsbach, represented the unanimous expression of the County Convention, some of them being men who opposed the regular nominees of our party last year, but are now satisfied they suffer a greater evil than they feared. They have a superior Adm. County Ticket in Juniata, and intend to elect it.

We rejoice in these indications, and now think we will have a gain on our last year's majority on the State Ticket in this Congressional District, of 700 to 1,000 votes.

Snyder can not claim to have 6 to 4 for Union or 3 for Juniata. Balsbach and Orwig's election, will leave it all fair and satisfactory--Snyder 5, Union 5, and Juniata 4--14 years--which ends the present Apportionment.

Mr. Balsbach is recommended to us as a plain, straight-forward man, always right on the great issues of the day, for some years past an extensive dealer in grain, &c., at Perryville.

Respecting the defeat of Capt. Roush, the Middleburg Tribune says: "We suppose his loyalty to the Southern brethren" was suspected. True, it matters very little who has the honor of being defeated; and indeed, as far as we are concerned, we would rather see two unadorned Copperheads, like Hibbich and Weiser, beheaded, than that a Union Democrat like Capt. Roush, whose only fault is running with a bad machine, should be sacrificed. It, however, shows the desperation of the Democratic leaders. They have thrown themselves, body and soul, into the arms of the Rebels, and nothing that savors of Union or support of the Government, is allowed, by Jack Cummings and Frank Weirick, to capture their Copperhead ticket; hence, Capt. Roush must needs go overboard. We hope the Captain will see what kind of company he is in."

In New York city, the appeals in two drafted districts leave figures thus: Discharged for all causes, 239 Received and substituted, 85 Paid the \$300 24 85 men out of 318

This gives the Army 1 out of every 4 men drafted--say 5,000 from that city. The exonerations on account of alienage are large: such men are "spotted," and will be released from voting, which will be one way of serving their country, for the Anti-Administration vote will fall off in about the same proportion.

Some Progress.
Sunday night last, the Rebels were so hard pressed on Morris Island, that most of them abandoned it, leaving 75 men, large amount of artillery, and of ammunition. Thus fell Fort Wagner, Gregg and Cumming's Point into the hands of Gen. Gillmore. The city of Charleston and the harbor are now more under his guns, and "Babylon's" fall is hastening on.

Chattanooga, is Ours.
On Wednesday of this week, after a series of masterly movements by Rosecrans, Crittenden entered Chattanooga without a fight, the Rebels retreating eastward.

Thus crumbles Rebellion at the South. Let the friends of the Union defeat the sympathizers with the Rebels at the polls, in the North, and our present drafted men will close the War.

Burnside in Knoxville.
At last, the Union flag waves in triumph over the heart of East Tennessee, whence it was banished by an overbearing Rebel force of strangers nearly two years ago. The dispatch to the Nashville Union is dated Bridgeport, Ala., and says:

"The Tennesseans are flocking in daily from the mountains in companies of thirties and fifties, and enrolling themselves in our army. Yesterday 85 came into Stevenson, and the day before 150. Every man has his own horse, bridle and saddle, and only needs a musket. They all want to join immediately, and demand mustering into service at once."

East Tennessee had already several thousand gallant men in our armies, beside the thousands of devoted Unionists who have been forced into those of Jeff. Davis, or shot because they refused to be. We can not doubt, however, that the caves and dens of her wooded mountains contain thousands more who will eagerly hasten to do battle for their country against the traitors who have so long oppressed and hunted them. Tennessee, we trust, will very soon be wholly and evermore restored to the Union.
