There shall be an additional section to the the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows: "Secrees 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrane in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are or shall be prescribe: by law as fully and effectually as if they were present at their usual places of election.
