In 1863. We find the hopes for the election of Woodward depend chiefly upon that "worst part of the population of foreign countries," who try to "control our elections" and "brow beat American citizens at the polls" in New York city and the mining regions. The outrages of these condjutors of Woodward, are fresh in the memory of the people.
